





SIGN OF THE TIMES- POLITICAL SIGNS

With elections just around the corner it's time to talk politics, the politics of political signs that is.

Signs will be popping up around the township in support of local candidates.



Residents can help keep the township beautiful during election season by understanding and following the rules for Political Signs in section 090-130(11) of the Middle Smithfield Township Zoning Ordinance as follows.

Political Signs:

Political signs are permitted in all districts, provided that:

- No political sign shall be displayed more than 15 days after the election or vote to which the sign pertains.
- A political sign shall not be posted on Township property (e.g. township parks, township building, or golf course), except as may be allowed outside of a polling place on Election Day.
- The maximum sign size shall be 16 square feet on each of two sides. Any larger sign shall be regulated as an off-premise sign (such as a billboard).
- A political sign for any candidate or issue shall not be located within 100 feet of any other sign for the same candidate on the same lot that is readable from the same street.

Signs on Public Property

A sign posted on Township property or within a public street right-of-way without governmental permission may be removed and discarded. This applies to ALL signs.

Signs on Private Property

No person shall post a sign upon private property without permission from the property owner. A sign posted on private property without permission of the property owner may be removed and discarded by the property owner or his/her designee.



BUDGET AND FINANCE UPDATE: DOLLARS & SENSE

The Township continues to be good stewards of the township budget, and the outlook for 2023 remains positive (check out our website for the budget and finance presentation made in December of 2022)

In the financial landscape, we continue to see real estate transfers up (i.e., property sales), however, they are slowing down a bit. As the job market rose, we saw our receipt of earned income tax go up too, and that has slowed a bit as well. All of this bodes well for the financial health of the township going into 2023.

We are improving the operational efficiency of the township with the introduction and adoption of a new time and attendance payroll system for our employees. This automated system will increase data integrity, by reducing human errors, and allow the Budget and Finance Manager to devote time and expertise in more valuable areas (like grant writing assistance). This system will increase efficiency by allowing managers more time to work at their department's core goals rather than time spent on payroll administration

Meanwhile, employees will have 24/7 access to their payroll and paid time off information, and be able to manage time easily (no more paper forms!) Our auditors will love this system for its integrity, employees and managers will love it for convenience, and taxpayers will love it for saving time (aka money).

THE FUTURE IS BRIGHT!

Who doesn't want to save on electricity bills nowadays? Especially if you are paying a commercial rate. Great news! Middle Smithfield Township successfully applied for a Local Share Account grant for solar panels for the Community & Cultural Center in the amount of \$80,000, with \$20,000 in matching funds from the Township. Once the Township was awarded the LSA grant, the Township then successfully applied for a Keystone Grant in the amount of \$80,000. That's \$160,000 in grant funds, with \$20,000 in Township funds, for a solar project that will significantly decrease the operating costs of the Community & Cultural Center, and likewise, the Library of the Smithfields housed within.

What is unique about these grant awards is that usually, grants are used for purchases for items to complete a project, or capital improvements – rarely is there an opportunity for grant funding to decrease annual operating costs. "In a sense, the grant will keep on giving, as we keep on saving with this operational efficiency – we will see a significant savings in electric bills not just when the grant project is completed and solar panels are installed, but every year after that, for the lifetime of the panels" said Annette Atkinson, Township Supervisor.

With electric costs currently approximately \$20,000 a year for the building (and constantly rising), even

Our projects have been Granted!

We are fortunate that outside agencies also see the value in our projects, and believe in them too. What Budget and Finance Manager doesn't love the cost of projects being shared by other agencies, stretching the municipal tax dollars further! Just to mention a few:

- \$160,000 in total from the Monroe County Local Share Account and the Keystone Grant for Solar Panels for the Community & Cultural Center (see below)
- \$25,000 Healing the Planet Grant for Echo Lake Park (see page 13)
- \$20,000 from the Pocono Mountain Visitors Bureau for an information and interactive kiosk at the Community & Cultural Center (see page 11)
- \$10,000 from the Pocono Mountain Visitors Bureau for a Veterans Memorial at the Community & Cultural Center (see page 11)
- \$7,800 Monroe County Open Space Grant for Echo Lake Park (see page 13)
- \$5,000 for the Community Gardens Park to refurbish hardscapes and raised garden beds. (see page 13)
- \$2,500 from One Percent for Nature for Echo Lake Park (see page 13)
- \$500 microgrant from Pocono Arts Council for the Great Hall at the Community and Cultural Center

Add to that hundreds of thousands in project grants for Public Works over the last two years! (stay tuned for more!)

a 75% reduction would result in reaping 19 times the amount of the Township's initial investment in energy savings, over the expected lifetime of the panels.

The Board of Supervisors sincerely thanks all the elected officials, including our Congressman and County Commissioners that supported both state grant applications, but especially our State Representatives resulting in a winning outcome for all using state funds: Senator Rosemary Brown, State Representative Maureen Madden, State Representative Tara Probst.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE

The Steering Committee focused on revitalizing, energizing, enhancing, improving the Route 209 corridor and suggested ways to promote improved design standards for all areas of the Township. (Check out "Revitalize 209" on page 6).



On January 27, 2022, the Board of Supervisors adopted the Comprehensive Plan.

On July 15, 2022, a draft of part 2 of the Comprehensive Plan Update was mailed to the surrounding townships, Monroe County Planning Commission and the East Stroudsburg Area School District for comments. This update took a hard look at Appendix B: the land use, community facilities, utilities and transportation & circulation.

On September 8, 2022, the Board of Supervisors adopted the Comprehensive Plan Update 2022 (#2) as an update to the previously adopted Comprehensive Plan on January 27, 2022.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

A Planning Commission is a body of citizens that serve within local government, acting as an advisory group to the Board of Supervisors on issues and policies related to planning, land use regulation, and community development. The Planning Commission acts as citizen planners and works to develop plans and implement policies that affect how their community manages changes in growth and development.

The Planning Commission plays a crucial role in shaping the future of the community. Considering the future of the community and developing plans to guide growth and development is both complex and time consuming. While the Planning Commission acts in an advisory role, they represent the community at large. The Planning Commission should be unbiased regarding requests and proposals and consider the overall impact on the community as a whole.

It is common for planning commissions to regularly receive development plan proposals for review and recommendation. While the Planning Commission is tasked with administering subdivision and land development regulations, commissions should look beyond adopted requirements and make suggestions on other ways to improve what is being proposed.

MIDDLE SMITHFIELD TO "REVITALIZE 209" WITH GRANT PROGRAM

Middle Smithfield Township established its own matching grant program to foster \$750,000 of property improvements along its six-mile stretch of Milford Road, aka Route 209.

The grant will fund projects that are visible from 209 to improve building facades, curb appeal, and safety; project size is up to \$20,000 in cost, with the Revitalize 209 grant and the applicant each providing \$10,000 to fund the project. (the resolutions can be found on the township's website at bit.ly/Revitalize209GRANT). The township's portion of the total funds (\$375,000) was made possible by the American Rescue Plan Act.

The grant will be administered by an ad hoc advisory committee that may be comprised of members of the township's Planning Commission, Economic Development and Historical Committees, and members of the public.

"The 209 Revitalization Grant Program offers business owners the opportunity to promote the time-honored proven practice, 'An inviting appearance invites customers,'" said Joe Memoli, Chair of the Economic Development Committee.

Why Revitalize 209?

"We recently updated the township's Comprehensive Plan, based on a survey of all our residents" said Mark Oney, Township Supervisor, Planning and Zoning Director, "and our residents made very clear the importance of a thriving, well maintained thoroughfare. Streetscaping is certainly worth our time and effort."

For Middle Smithfield Township, dubbed the "Gateway to the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area", Milford Road aka Route 209 serves as the main artery of the township, which sees more than 18,000 trips every day connecting tourists and residents with businesses, schools, parks and recreation, and houses of worship. Scores of tourists all year round frequent of the 4 golf courses, ski areas, and 4 parks (including one of the first dog parks in the county) along and just off of the 6 mile stretch of Route 209.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE

At the May 11th Board of Supervisors Meeting, the Supervisors will hold two public hearings, one regarding the Nuisance Alarm Ordinance (see page 19) and one regarding the proposed Township Property Maintenance Ordinance, as a less restrictive alternative to the International Public Maintenance Code, to establish regulations for the maintenance of properties within the township, and providing for remedial action by the township in specified situations, and prescribing penalties for code violations. The proposed Property Maintenance Code defines minimum health and safety requirements for buildings, structures, and/or properties to be safe, sound, sanitary and secure and not present a health and/or safety hazard to surrounding properties or to the general populace.

At over 22,329 sq. ft., the new location will add upwards of 25 members to its team.

A project by Hix Snedeker Companies LLC, Tractor Supply will be the fourth installment to the business community behind AutoZone, The Dollar General, and the Apartments at Mt. Nebo who chose Middle Smithfield Township due to the great advantages of its Local Economic Revitalization Tax Assistance Act (LERTA) program.

"Tractor Supply has specific criteria a property must meet in order for them to build a store," says Ashley Diaz, the Development Coordinator with the Hix Snedeker Company. "We had presented several sites in the area to them. The LERTA program was a driving factor in this decision, and ultimately pushed this property ahead of the others."

Residents can expect a soft opening within a few weeks and dates for the grand opening will be announced shortly. Stay tuned.

WHAT IS LERTA?

With LERTA, taxing authorities (County, Municipal, and School District) can grant abatements on improvements to business properties in designated zones (In Middle Smithfield, the C1 and C2 commercial zones, and the Industrial Zone). The base taxes (i.e., the annual taxes the business is already paying) would still be due on time and in full every year, but the additional taxes based on the increased assessed value of the property would be phased in over 5 years (0% the first year, 20% the second year, 40% the third year, and each year increasing by 20% until 100% of the taxes are realized in year 6).

The LERTA program is what brought Tractor Supply to Middle Smithfield Township.

DO I NEED A ZONING PERMIT?

Zoning permits are required whenever a property owner intends to build a structure, add onto a building or structure, alter a building or structure, and/or change the use of land or buildings. So, if you're planning on making improvements to your property, the answer to the question, "Do I need a permit?" is probably yes.

A permit is issued when the property owner, through submission of an application and supporting documentation, (such as a plot plan) demonstrates the proposed improvements are in compliance with the zoning ordinance, i.e., the proposed shed will be set-back far enough from the property boundary. Obtaining a zoning permit prior to the start of work is a legal obligation of the property owner. Issuance of a zoning permit demonstrates the proposed improvement is lawful, and as such, obtaining a zoning permit helps to protect the value of the investment.

Most people are aware that a permit is required to build a house or garage, but sometimes it's not so clear when contemplating projects of a smaller scope. The lists to the right identifies some common residential improvements and whether or not a zoning permit is required.

Keep in mind: In addition to the requirement of a zoning permit, many of the projects listed to the right may also require a building permit in accordance with the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code, and sometimes building permits may be required when a zoning permit is not, such as for changes to plumbing or electrical work.

IT'S SMOOTH SALE-ING!

Yard sale season is in full swing in Middle Smithfield Township. Each property holding a yard sale must obtain a permit from the Zoning Office. It's a simple one-page application with a nominal fee of \$15 of which \$10 is refundable when you take down your signs.

Homeowners associations and charitable organizations can hold community yard sales at a designated property of their choice. Some common property choices are a local church parking lot, fire station or community clubhouse. Many will charge a fee to rent a spot or table at the sale. This is a great way for residents whose community does not allow individual yard sales to come together and sell off some unwanted item. It also usually benefits the organization sponsoring the sale.

The following projects do NOT need a zoning permit:

- Planting a garden.
- Planting trees and landscaping (unless it involves construction of walls and/or hardscaping).
- Constructing/installing a garden pond. Note: large ponds involving alteration of drainage patterns and storm water flow require a permit.
- Erecting a swing set or trampoline.
- Placement of a seasonal, child's wading pool, provided it is less than 24" deep.
- Replacing siding.
- Replacing roofing. (**building permit is required)
- Replacing windows and doors provided the size of the openings are not changing, and the work does not involve alterations, e.g., changing a door opening into a window or a window into a door.
- Home repairs, cosmetic improvements, and maintenance.

There are a few rules to keep in mind when planning a yard sale including "A yard sale shall not include wholesale sales or sale of new merchandise of a type typically found in retail stores." (Township Code Chapter 200 section 044-080 H2-2) This doesn't mean that a resident cannot sell that pair of jeans that still has the tag on them. It does mean, however, that a resident owning a business or items from a business cannot sell them at a yard sale. If you own a business or are a local crafter and would like to sell your items, you can contact our local flea market at (570) 223-8640 to inquire about a space.

Have items left over from your Yard Sale? No worries! You can bring them to Freecycle *a part of the Township Clean Up event – see the article on page 15.)

Want to skip the Yard Sale altogether and donate your items to a good cause so they can conduct a yard sale? Check out your local places of worship. The Wooddale United Methodist Church on Barren Road is currently accepting donations for their May Yard Sale.

INTERACTIVE KIOSKS COMING SOON!

We are excited to announce that in 2022 we were awarded \$20,000 by the Pocono Mountains Visitors Bureau Community Impact Grant to go towards interactive kiosks for the museum area of the Community and Cultural Center.

The Middle Smithfield Township Community and Cultural Center Museum planned for the Great Hall has several phases:



Phase 1:

- Artwork hanging system for interchangeable displays by local art groups and artists such as paintings, photos, quilts, etc. (Completed in 2022.)
- Display case funded in part by a grant from the Pocono Arts Council for rotating displays of physical artifacts, including items from the Marshalls Creek Explosion, The Marshalls Creek Mastodon, The Flood of '55 and more. (Completed in 2022)
- Free-standing Kiosk with interactive displays and media player for self-guided multi-media "tours" of the exhibits including photos, videos and narratives for residents and tourists alike. (Coming Soon!)

Electronically Changing Signage: Two screens, one for the entrance to the Library of the Smithfields and one for the entrance to the Community Room, to inform residents of current and upcoming programming for each facility, announcements, township news, events in the area (Coming Soon!)

Phase 2:

- Mosier's Dairy installation: Mosier's Dairy was an icon of the Smithfields area for centuries, and Middle Smithfield salvaged architectural pieces such as the original hand-hewn support beams and sleeper logs, examples of pegged wood construction including American Chestnut wood (once common now virtually extinct due to blight), original slate roofing, barnwood siding, etc. Phase 2 plans are to incorporate these pieces not only as floor to ceiling architectural elements in the Great Hall, but also finishes as columns are wrapped in original barnwood, and walls wainscoted in original slate shingles indigenous to our area.

This sustainable project will, without a doubt, improve the quality of life in the township while having a lasting impact on the community by providing educational and historical resources to both our community and its visitors.

\$10,000 GRANT AWARDED FROM PMVB FOR VETERAN'S MEMORIAL EXPANSION

Middle Smithfield Township was awarded \$10,000 by the Pocono Mountains Visitors Bureau for the 2023 Community Impact Grant for the expansion of the Veteran's Memorial at the Community and Cultural Center.

The Veterans Memorial project entails a bronze statue, monument stones, shields, and flags for every branch of the military, along with a full-sized flag and flagpole, and a "memory walk" of paver stones engraved with the names of Monroe County veterans leading from the parking lot to the Community & Cultural Center. The 5 utility poles along Milford Road as well as lamp poles within the Community & Cultural Center entrance drive and parking lot (all visible from Milford Road) will be fitted with banners participating in the "Hometown Heroes/Patriots Remembered" program, with each banner honoring a local veteran. The entire area will be a landscaped Memorial Garden planted by Master Gardeners with native plants, and a field of poppies, the official flower of the American Legion. The Penn State Extension Master Gardeners of Monroe County completed the landscaping of the 2,500 square foot rain garden with over 3,000 native plants, complete with stone path leading to the centerpiece of the raingarden: the American Flag and flagpole, that was an Eagle Scout project dedicated to the township By Joe Schuon. The project also includes improvements to the flagpole such as improved lighting for the American flag.

This project will be done in partnership with several local non-profits and veteran's organizations including: Boy Scout Troop 87, Boy Scout Troop 902, Monroe County Honor Guard, Middle Smithfield Township Community Gardeners, Penn State Master Gardeners, Vietnam Veterans, The VALOR Clinic, The American Legion, and more!

RECENT PARKS GRANTS

Middle Smithfield Township Parks & Recreation have been fortunate to receive several grants to support improvement projects in the last few years.

In 2022, the township received a \$2,500 grant from 1 For Nature to purchase nine new benches for Echo Lake Park. The township also received a \$7,800 grant from Monroe County Open Space to fund improvements to the walking trail at Echo Lake Park not covered by the 2021 Healing the Planet Grant. This work is still ongoing and expected to finish in 2023.

In 2023, the township received a \$5,000 grant from 1 For Nature to resurface the parking area and walking paths at Community Gardens Park, and to purchase enough building material to replace 75 of the raised garden plots at that park. This project is ongoing and expected to finish in 2023.

In 2021, the township received a \$25,000 Healing the Planet Grant from Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful and the Giant Company. This money funded improvements to the walking trail at Echo Lake Park, new trash cans at Echo Lake Park, and a new rain garden at the entrance to the Community & Cultural Center (photo to the left).

To use the facility, you must be a resident of one of the participating townships or a commercial business (via permit only) located in the townships. Acceptable materials include leaves, shrubs (no roots), tree trimmings, and branches cut into 3-4 foot lengths and no larger than 12 inches in diameter.

The facility offers self-serve as well as loaded assistance. These self-serve products include FREE mulch and compost (pending availability), and you must load the materials yourself. If you would like loading assistance an appointment must be made Monday through Friday; Saturdays the facility is staffed and does not require an appointment. For loaded materials the cost is \$10 for 3 yards.

OAK GROVE RECAP

The Oak Grove Multi-Municipal Compost Facility did nothing short of thrive from 2020-2022. Since the facilities opening in 2013 the amount of product being brought in and taken out has steadily increased each year, but during 2020 it skyrocketed! The total yards of leaves, woodchips and brush brought in went from 13,440 yards in 2019 to 20,868 yards in 2020, it dropped a little bit to 17,761 yards in 2021 and 16,842 yards in 2022. To say the facility is busy is a huge understatement, but we are so happy that residents from all three of the Townships (Lehman, Middle Smithfield and Smithfield) are using the facility.

During 2020 we were able to secure a 902 Recycling grant in the amount of \$350,000.00 and traded our original Beast Grinder in to purchase a brand new 2021 Vermeer HG-6000 Horizontal Grinder for the facility. With the purchase of this new grinder it will better help to keep up with the growing demand at the facility and help to process the brush faster to make mulch and leaves faster to make compost.

Then in the Fall of 2021 we again applied for the 902 Recycling grant, this time being awarded \$229,819.00 to pay off the balance of the grinder purchase.

Along with an increase in residents using the facility, we also have seen an increase in commercial permits. 

911 ADDRESS SIGNS – IT COULD SAVE YOUR LIFE!

Since 2011 Monroe County, along with local municipalities, has been working to make sure every residence has a 911 reflective address marker on their property. Not only is it required in accordance with Chapter 85 of the Township Code but it is vitally important for the health, safety and welfare of all residents and visitors to have the required 911 address sign properly mounted so that police, firefighters and other first responders can find a home or place of business in the case of an emergency.

Proper placement of a 911 Address Sign is also a requirement of Chapter 179, Use & Occupancy of Real Property, when you apply for a Resale, Use & Occupancy Certificate when selling or leasing your home or commercial space.

911 Address Signs can be purchased through Bushkill Emergency Corp for \$20.00 or you can purchase the parts of the sign from a local hardware store and create the sign on your own.

911 Address Sign Requirements:

- 6"x18" vertical sign, flat green with reflective white 4" letters
- Place sign at the end of your driveway where it intersects with the street
- The top of your number sign must be at least 3 feet and not more than 6 feet from the ground
- You may place your sign on a tree at the end of your driveway or your mailbox, only if it is at the end of your driveway. It must be visible from BOTH directions (special mounting hardware is available.)
- If you live in a townhouse, please contact the township regarding placement instructions.

Bushkill Emergency Corps

Back in 1965 when Bushkill Emergency Corps was first organized, the need for an ambulance came, oh, maybe a couple times a month. Then it grew

to a couple of times a week, then a day, now it's often a couple of times an hour which is why it is both vital that the service is there and that it is supported by those who may need it at a moment's notice.

With many residents relocating here from areas where ambulance service is a municipal or tax supported service, that is currently not the case in our area. A significant portion of the financial support local nonprofit ambulances receive comes directly from subscription programs. This ambulance service, like other community-based non-profit services, relies on the support of our residents and local officials. As a service that must be available regardless of use, the support of the community to ensure that there is someone to answer your call is most important.

Bushkill Emergency Corps subscriptions are sent out annually around the beginning of June. Residents may not be aware of the discounted (not an insurance policy) program for use of the service that a subscription provides. Ambulance service is vital and, like most medically related services, requires highly trained personnel, technically advanced equipment and a sincere commitment and passion for a patient's well-being.

Although a 911 call always assures an ambulance in an emergency situation, a subscription does many things for a subscriber. Mainly, it helps the Corps maintain operations, even when the wheels aren't rolling. *Continued on page 26.*



THE STATE OF EMERGENCY SERVICES

Everyone agrees that supporting our volunteer firefighters, and our ambulance companies is critical. That's easy! What's not so easy is to figure out the best way to do it.

In fourth quarter of 2022, four municipalities (Middle Smithfield, Smithfield, Price and Delaware Water Gap) joined together to contract with JLN Associates, LLC to conduct a comprehensive study of our area emergency response providers. The findings and recommendations will provide guidance for right-sizing municipal support, as well as ways for all fire companies, ambulance companies, and municipalities to collaborate and maximize resources.

The study is expected to be completed in the 2nd quarter of 2023.

ABOUT THE MARSHALLS CREEK EXPLOSION

Just before dawn on June 26, 1964 a truck travelling north on Milford Road, that was carrying the oxidizing ingredient in fertilizer, blew two tires and proceeded to catch fire. When a passing driver noticed the smoke they used a nearby payphone to call the Marshalls Creek Fire Company.

The fire company arrived shortly after 4 am and moments after their arrival the truck exploded killing three volunteer fire fighters and three bystanders. 10 others were injured and the explosion cost close to a million dollars in damage. The three fire fighters killed in the blast were Earl Miller, 50, Leonard Mosier, 38, and Edward Hines, 42.

Bystanders killed were John Regina, a 23-year-old local resident, Joseph Horvath, a truck driver from Scranton, and Lillian Paesch from Baltimore.

The truck was not marked and fire fighters who arrived to the scene were unaware that it was carrying explosives. Afterwards the Marshalls Creek Explosion became a textbook example of the dangers of hazardous materials on the roadway.

After the explosion more than a dozen local fire chiefs petitioned state and local representatives to have precautions in place to protect volunteers.



As stated in the Hazardous Materials Chemistry for Emergency Responders the explosion "led to the implementation of the DOT placarding and labeling system and the development on the ERG (Emergency Response Guidebook)."

In 2014 for the 50th Anniversary of the explosion the Marshalls Creek Fire Company built a memorial to honor the members who lost their lives. A dedication ceremony was also held and was attended by local fire companies from around the area, as well as locals who vowed to never forget the tragedy.

The public can visit the memorial located at the Marshalls Creek Fire House located at Marshalls Creek Road and Resica Falls Road.

Founded in 1921, the Monroe County Historical Association preserves and shares the rich history of Monroe County. The organization is housed in the 1795 Stroud Mansion, located at the corner of Main and 9th Street in downtown Stroudsburg and maintains a local history museum and research library.

As a cultural and learning center, the Monroe County Historical Association will begin construction in the Spring on the Heritage Center adjacent to the Stroud Mansion to inspire and serve the public as the county-wide historical organization. The Heritage Center will increase opportunities to teach lessons of history that provide direction to the future and enhance the quality of life and appreciation of community and culture.

The benefits of the Heritage Center project include 1) a community room for expanded educational programs, workshops, lectures, special exhibits, and community events; 2) providing accessibility for all residents 3) ensuring the preservation of Monroe County's valuable archives and artifacts; 4) maintaining the integrity of the historic 1795 Stroud Mansion.

The renderings show the architectural design of the Heritage Center. In keeping with the US Department of the Interior's Preservation Brief 14, the PA State Historic Preservation Office, and the Stroudsburg Historical Preservation Ordinance, the Heritage Center addition uses the same materials and a simplified design that references the historic building, but does not copy to create a fake "old" appearance.

The Stroud Mansion Museum is closed during construction, but the offices are open, and the library is available by appointment only at the temporary office at 748 Main Street, Stroudsburg.






Wayne Bolt

“Route 209 is the gateway to our National Recreation Area, and our Litter and Beautification Committee, as well as our Adopt a Road Volunteers and residents, spend a significant amount of time and energy to beautifying Route 209, whether it’s picking up litter in our twice a year ‘1000 Feet of Street’ program, or maintaining flowerboxes along the route – it’s nice to see that effort expand to our storefronts” said Mike Dwyer, Township Supervisor, Public Works and Parks and Recreation Director.

What does the Grant include?

The Revitalize 209 Grant Program will fund remodeling and updating building facades, repairs, upgrades, window and door replacement, landscaping, benches for public use, cleaning, etc. -- all improving the 209 experience for both visitors and residents alike.

“The township has many tools in its Economic Development toolbox, such as the LERTA program, which attracted new projects such as Tractor Supply, Autozone, Dollar General and the Apartments on Mt. Nebo. This is yet another means to stimulate both economic development and pride in our community” said James Brechbiel, Economic Development Manager.

How does it work?

Property owners and tenants whose property faces Route 209 will submit letters of interest for projects up to \$20,000 in size, with the Revitalize 209 Grant matching up to 50% of costs. A Revitalize 209 Committee will review letters of interest and applications and make recommendations to the Middle Smithfield Township Board of Supervisors. The Committee may include up to two members each of the Middle Smithfield Township Economic Development Committee, the Planning Commission, and the Historical Commission, and up to four members of the public. All members must be a resident of Middle Smithfield Township.

“A beautiful, vibrant ‘Main Street’ connects us all – it’s not just a business corridor, but the front door to our township, and shapes the character of our township and something our entire community -- residents and business owners alike -- can be proud of. It’s certainly a worthy investment for our future” said Annette Atkinson, Township Supervisor, Administrative & Operations Director.

As the flyer you receive says, the subscription allows for unlimited use of emergency medical services, allows for emergency transports to a local hospital per the Bushkill Emergency Corps policy, it also allows for the Corps to forgive an unpaid portion of a bill beyond any medical insurance payment, as well as allowing for terms of payment if necessary.

With respect to insurance, the Corps bills most insurance companies directly. Some insurance carriers issue checks directly to the patient/subscriber. When a payment or denial is received, the payment/denial should be forwarded to the ambulance corps providing the service. Not doing so is considered insurance fraud and also voids the subscription benefits.

Bushkill Emergency Corps can also supply a form used to purchase a 911 marker sign. Having an updated and well positioned 911 marker will come in handy and certainly makes a big difference when there is an emergency (Or your mail order delivery person is searching for you). *See more about 911 signs on page 18.*

VOTING FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



What is a primary election?

- Each political party selects its candidates to run for office during the general election. The candidates who get the highest number of votes in the primary election go on to run in the general election. Voters also vote for their party’s officers during a primary election.

When is Primary Election Day?

- May 16, 2023

Can you vote in a primary election?

- Yes, you must be registered by May 1, 2023 to vote in the primary election and must be registered with a political party to vote in that party’s primary.
- You must be registered as a Democrat to vote in the Democratic primary, or registered as a Republican to vote in the Republican Primary.

When is Election Day?

- November 7th, 2023

When is the last day to register to vote in Pennsylvania?

- The last day to register for the General Election is October 23rd, 2023. You can register here: bit.ly/PA-Voter-Registration-Application

Is it possible to vote by mail?

- For the primary election, yes, it is possible to vote by mail. You will need to apply for a mail-in ballot by May 9th.
- For the November election, it is possible to vote by mail. You will need to apply for a mail-in ballot by October 31st on your county election board website here: bit.ly/Contact-Your-Election-Officials or you can apply online at pavoterservices.pa.gov

Where are the voter drop boxes?

- Instead of mailing in your ballot, you may drop off your completed ballot by 8 pm on voting day at the following locations:

What happens if I moved before Election Day?

- Your address can be updated to where you live now but there are certain guidelines you must follow:
- Moved within 30 days of the election, you can vote at the old polling place for your old address
- If you moved to Pennsylvania from another state 30 days within the election, you cannot vote in Pennsylvania
