

A WORD FROM YOUR TOWNSHIP SUPERVISORS

We know it seems hard to believe, but it looks as if Spring is finally here! Hard to believe that with Spring peeking over our windowsills, it was ushered in by back to back nor'easters! We'd like to thank the first responders, and the road crews, who worked tirelessly to weather the storm.

As you might remember, Middle Smithfield Township was one of, if not the, worst hit area by Riley, with over 18" of snow, 55+ mile per hour winds, power loss of 3-8 days, and a sewer main break. We'd like to thank all the brave linemen who left their homes from as far as Ohio, North Carolina and Missouri to perform powerline repairs, including over 56 utility pole replacements. Our public works department received 55 PA One calls for excavation emergencies. They not only tirelessly plowed and cindered, interrupted by rescuing stranded vehicles and removing fallen trees from their paths, but fueled sewer pump station generators during the storm and lengthy power outage.

During all of this, the new public works facility in Wooddale proved itself to be a good decision: the township saved in the neighborhood of \$3,000 per storm by saving on labor, fuel, and equipment costs by staffing from Wooddale.

In this issue of the newsletter, we included a spread on our Emergency Services, who, unlike other states, are not solely funded by tax dollars, but by your much needed tax deductible donations. INCREASING TAX REVENUE WITHOUT INCREASING TAXES

The impacts of the recent snow storms have obviously affected all of us. The township expended a significant amount of funds for not only manpower to maintain our roads, but also expended funds for: additional staffing during the storms, additional diesel/gas to operate our own fleet, some of our emergency service providers vehicles, and our generators at the sewer stations and plant. Other expenses were incurred after the storms to restore many areas of the township that had trees down. (Our road crew didn't get any mailboxes this season, so we saved a couple hundred dollars there.)

Each year, at the beginning of the year, the township does not receive much income; taxes are not due until April. To cover expenses during the early months of the year, we rely on reserves to get us through. If we did not have these reserves, we would have to borrow and borrowing costs more, with interest. (These are called "TAN's" -- Tax Anticipation Notes.) Efforts are made each year to decrease expenses where possible, and still provide excellent service to our residents and business owners. Thankfully, Middle Smithfield Township is financially stable.

increase, to find ways to increase tax revenues without actually raising taxes. One of the most significant areas the Board of Supervisors hope to realize more revenue is by increasing the tax base (e.g., increasing the number of taxpayers, increasing property value). More commercial development complimentary to the character of our township not only contributes in the form of real estate taxes, but the jobs that go along with the new development also create income for our residents and Earned Income Tax (EIT.)

One most notable effort to unite those two objectives, decreasing expenses and increasing income, is by selling the golf course and surrounding township owned lands. The funds expended each year on the golf course can be better used to increase funding of our fire and ambulance companies that provide emergency services or improve our infrastructure or decrease taxes. The income that would be generated from putting that land back on the tax rolls (as long as the township owns it, the lands are tax exempt) as well as from a commercial development and a privately owned/operated golf course, would improve income for not only the township, but for the county and our school district. Turning an expense into an income only makes logical sense.

So, when we look at the township finances, we look at where we can not only decrease expenses, but areas where a potential exists



BIKE PARK SET TO OPEN FOR THE SEASON IN APRIL

Spring is coming, and that means the River's Edge Family Bike Park is set to open for the season! The park will open in April (exact date TBA) after some regular spring maintenance to make sure the park is ready to go.

Located on River Road in Smithfield Township, River's Edge features hills, berms, and bumps appropriate for all skill level bikers. The park was built in the summer and fall of 2017 and had a soft opening last year before it closed for the season. It drew bikers from as far

away as Philadelphia and Long Island because it is the largest pump track of its kind on the east coast.

The bike park is intended for bicycles only. No motorized vehicles of any kind are permitted. Helmets must be worn at all times. Other park rules are posted on site.


BEEKEEPER NEEDED



LOOKING FOR COMMUNITY SERVICES? JUST DIAL: 2-1-1 or visit, PoconoInfo.communityOS.org

United Way of Monroe County, in partnership with Pocono Alliance, Family Service Association of Northeastern PA, and United Way of Pennsylvania recently launched a 24-hour-7-days-a-week information and referral service for residents in Monroe County.

Whether it's information about opioid abuse, availability of child care services, accessing homeless shelters, connecting to federal assistance programs, or support for an aging parent, Monroe County residents need only dial, toll-free, 2-1-1 to connect with a caseworker who will guide them through a comprehensive database of local, state and federal health and human service programs available in our community.

"This is the first place people should call when they are in need of community services," says Maria Schramm, PoconoInfo Manager at Pocono Alliance, and one of the caseworker who handles calls to 2-1-1 for Monroe County residents. PoconoInfo has been an information and referral program supported by United Way and implemented by Pocono Alliance for years. Late last year, however, by bringing several partners together, this service is now available 24-hours-a-day 7-days-a-week and through the toll-free number: 2-1-1.

In addition to information and referral, 2-1-1 recently incorporate a new coordinated entry system for those calling who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. Connect To Home: Coordinated Entry System (CES) of Eastern PA – available through 2-1-1 – coordinates access, assessment, prioritization and referral into the housing crisis response system for all households and populations in a 33-county region, including Monroe County.

In the past, callers at risk of becoming homeless would be referred to different organizations assisting with housing, such as United Way partners, Salvation Army, Pocono Area Transitional Housing, Family Promise, Street 2 Feet, and others. Now, by calling 2-1-1, Connect To Home will place people directly into a system where homeless providers can immediately pull cases to ensure limited housing and

resources are prioritized for the people who need them the most, while generating more accurate data to address housing challenges in the future.

"Housing issues have always been one of the top reasons people call 2-1-1. We are pleased to partner in a coordinated effort to address homelessness," said Anne Fogoros, statewide operations director for PA 2-1-1. "A call to 2-1-1 connects you to a trained specialist who will ask questions about your housing needs. 2-1-1 information and referral specialists also refer callers to community services such as food programs, utility assistance and more. One call can address multiple needs."

In addition, this March, United Way of Monroe County launched a partnership with the County Commissioners and Federación Latina para Educación sobre Culturas Hispano - Americanas/ Federation of Latinos for Education about the Cultures of Hispanic America (FLECHA) to increase access to information, referral and case management services for the Hispanic community in Monroe and Pike Counties. Through the Latino Countywide Services Partnership, implemented by United Way, Hispanic callers to 2-1-1 with limited understanding of English are referred to a local Hispanic caseworker who will work closely with the caller to guide them through services available in the 2-1-1 database. The caseworker then works with the caller to ensure they are accessing the services they need through interpretation and translation needs.



Make Sure Your 911 Reflective Address Marker are Up and Visible

Since 2011 Monroe County, along with local municipalities, has been working to make sure every residence has a 911 reflective address marker on their property.

In addition to signs not being posted, recent storms and plowing efforts have knocked over some address markers. These signs help police, firefighters and other first responders who might not be familiar with an area find a home in the case of an emergency. If you need a sign or a replacement please visit www.bushkillemergencycorps.com/911-sign-order-form.html or call 570-223-1906.



Placement of your sign:

- Place sign at the end of your driveway where it intersects with the street
- The top of your number sign must be 4 feet from the ground
- You may place your sign on a tree at the end of your driveway or your mailbox, only if it is at the end of your driveway. However, it must be visible from BOTH directions (special mounting hardware is available.)
- Townhouses: if you live in a townhouse, please contact the township regarding placement instructions.

You can even save a trip to the Oak Grove Leaf Composting Facility, and drop off your leaves, too. Middle Smithfield Township's annual Spring Clean Up is Friday May 5th and Saturday May 6th from 7am to 4pm both days, with free paper shredding on Saturday from 10a-3p. (Friday, May 5th, locked bins will be on the premises to drop off.)

Participating residents share the cost to operate the clean-up with the township: the clean-up costs \$5 per car load (slightly more for larger vehicles) and tire disposal starts at \$4 each tire. For residents, the township clean-up is much more economical and convenient than the closest dumps in Taylor and Pen Argyl, which charge a minimum of \$62-\$73 per vehicle. Still, if you literally have a ton of stuff, we included the dump information below this article.

Residents must bring proof of residency such as a tax bill, rent receipt, drivers license, etc. in order to participate. This is an extremely "user friendly" program!

Middle Smithfield will accept bulk items, furniture, toys, washers, dryers, bicycles, lawn mowers, water heaters, batteries, nails, screws, empty paint cans – just no household garbage, construction debris or hazardous materials. (Have more questions? See "DETAIL" at the end of this article.)

THE ZONING OFFICE HOSTS ANOTHER COURSE FOR LOCAL MUNICIPALITIES.

“The Course in Zoning” was held at the Middle Smithfield Township building for three consecutive weeks in March offering local and neighboring residents, volunteers, and staff, the opportunity to learn the “nuts and bolts” of drafting, amending, administering and monitoring zoning ordinances.

With many residents moving here from areas where ambulance service is a municipal service, it may be interesting to learn that is not the case in our area. As a matter of fact, a significant portion of the financial support our local non-profit ambulances receive comes directly from our subscription programs. Ambulance services in our area rely upon the kind support of our residents and local officials. Ambulance service is vital and of course, like most medically related services, requires highly trained personnel, technically advanced equipment and a sincere commitment and passion for patient's well-being. Subscriptions help provide for updating equipment as well as providing advanced training programs.

The subscription provides a discounted rate for portions of billings not covered by your insurance for services determined to be “medically necessary” by their standards. Our subscription program is honored through our Mutual Aid agreements with surrounding ambulance services. (Suburban EMS, St. Luke’s EMS, Pocono Mountain Regional EMS, West End EMS and Regional EMS) This means that seven services will honor the program.

With respect to insurance payments, the Corps bills most insurance companies directly. Some insurance carriers issue checks directly to the patient/subscriber. When a payment or denial is received, the payment/denial should then be forwarded to the ambulance corps providing the service. Not doing so is considered insurance fraud and voids the subscription benefits.

With the current uncertainty of healthcare coverages, a subscription is perhaps even more important than ever before and subscription rates have remained the same as last year.

The Oak Grove Multi-Municipal Compost Processing program is jointly operated and available to residents of Middle Smithfield, Smithfield and Lehman Townships. The facility is centrally located at 3305 Oak Grove Drive in Middle Smithfield Township and is open Monday – Saturday, 7am – 2 pm. Closed Holidays

To use the facility you must be a resident of one of the participating townships or a commercial business (via permit only) located in the townships.

Acceptable materials include leaves, shrubs (no roots) and shrubbery, tree trimmings, and branches cut into 3 -4 foot lengths and no larger than 12 inches in diameter.

FREE MULCH / COMPOST / WOOD CHIPS

The Oak Grove facility is a regular provider of mulch and compost to the MST Community Gardens on Collbaugh Road. Your garden can benefit too! Self-serve products and materials offered at the facility are free mulch and compost up to three (3) yards (pending availability), and you must load the materials yourself. If loading assistance is needed an appointment must be made in advance and the fee is \$10 for each 3 yards.

2018 Capital Improvement Projects:

Rehabilitation of Pump Station #1:

Replace 150,000 gallon Steel Equalization Tank/Pumping Station at the Fernwood Wastewater Treatment Plant. Tank is now operational and cleanup of old tank is underway.



"When I see many of our school pictures by Mr Wallingford, I feel I am back at my old school desk or walking the old oak wooden floor in the hallway. Wallingford was often the 'unofficial photographer' for many gym demonstration shows, concerts, holiday school programs and other events. These photos paint a fond, simple era of elementary school back in the 50s, 60s and 70s." said Steven Kulick, whose father, Joseph M Kulick, was principal of Middle Smithfield School from the late 40s until his retirement in the late 80s, and often spoke of Glenn's dedication to the school and "his classroom kids" children. The amazing field trips offered children the opportunity to see sights they normally would possibly not see on their own. From Washington DC to Hershey Museum/park to coal mines

to Roadside America Attraction, Mr Wallingford provided education in ways that would be remembered by students many years later now as parents and grandparents.


Kulick appreciates the donated photos digitized, curated and promoted by township supervisors and staff. "They truly care about our community, and area history", Steven said.

RSVP: VOLUNTEERING ENRICHES YOUR LIFE WHILE HELPING OTHERS

Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) of Monroe County is 650+ strong, eager and experienced adults aged 55 and over, giving back to their community by volunteering in a number of ways. With just as little as two hours a month, RSVP volunteers are making life better for thousands of residents in our county. For 28 years, RSVP has been on the front lines helping the most vulnerable populations right here in our country.

We have grocery shoppers, friendly visitors, tutors, storytellers, minor home repair volunteers, crafters, meal deliveries, hospital assistants and so much more. With almost 90,000 hours a year of donated time, our volunteers are making a huge impact in the lives of those who need assistance most in our county.

There's a lid for every pot, as they say. Whatever is your talent, your passion or your curiosity, RSVP can help make a great match for your volunteer service. As the weather begins to warm up, our Minor Home Repair program becomes more active. Our goal this year is to build three handicapped ramps for the three residents who fit the criteria. We need people who enjoy working outdoors and can use a hammer. The Minor Home Repair program also installs safety bars and performs minor fixes all year round, so retired contractors who are looking for something to do using their skills to help those in need, are always in demand.

For our hand crafters, keep those hands busy and the blood flowing by crocheting and knitting lap robes for the wheel-chair bound seniors or nap blankets for our Head Start students. This year we started a new project to crochet recycled plastic bags into sleeping mats for the homeless.

This is a great project plus a wonderful way to connect with others who have similar interests.

We currently have almost 100 volunteers who contribute two to four days a month grocery shopping or paying a friendly visit to homebound seniors. We have volunteers in almost every food pantry and volunteers who specifically want to help our veterans get back on their feet. Perhaps one of the most rewarding volunteer opportunities, these programs provide much socialization and food security to our seniors who may not talk to another adult for weeks.

Many of these requests have blossomed into treasured friendships over the years. Some of our teachers who will soon be retiring from the school system have enjoyed using their classroom skills to help tutor students or read to pre-K toddlers. It's like having all the fun of still being in the classroom without the pressure of having to attain learning benchmarks. Of course, there are certain state-mandated clearances that are necessary to be in the education program, but we can help walk you through the process. You don't have to be a teacher to do these tasks, you just have to love children.

Many of our volunteers enjoy learning and mentoring in areas that require specific training. The APPRISE program counsels seniors aged 65 and above about their Medicare coverage and helps find the most appropriate healthcare for them. All this training is provided by the State of PA. The Senior Medicare Patrol program educates seniors about preventing Medicare Fraud and is a great volunteer opportunity for anyone who enjoys public speaking.

Our newest program called SPECTACULAR is the only program in around here teaching young children how to speak Spanish. We are looking for Spanish-speaking volunteers who can help us grow that program to other areas of the county.

RSVP is always seeking new programs to add to its cache of serving 80+ different agencies. We can definitely find a way for you to spend those extra hours you have. Don't sit in front of your TV! ILLEGAL DUMPING: DON'T DO IT!



Illegal Dumping is a real and damaging problem at the Middle Smithfield Township recycling area. The Township's recycling area accepts ONLY:

CARDBOARD: corrugated cardboard and boxes,

PAPER: office, newspapers, magazines, junk mail, shredded paper, books, cereal boxes and the like

PLASTICS: all numbers accepted

METAL: aluminum, bi-metal cans, plastic bags, film and glass: all colors and has designated containers as such.

Anything else is illegal dumping.

The township has recently replaced its surveillance equipment, and installed several high quality digital surveillance cameras to get pictures/videos of illegal dumpers and pictures of their cars and license plates. Video/pictures are then given to the Monroe County Municipal Waste Management Authority Police Enforcement Department who files a complaint with the Monroe County Magisterial District Judge, and proceeds with enforcement.

Please call 570-643-6100 or visit thewasteauthority.com to find out how to dispose of household waste which is not accepted at our recycling area. Although, the township does offer its Spring/Fall Clean-Up which lets you dispose of your household waste for fractions of the cost of hauling to a waste fill.

Penalties

Someone convicted of illegal dumping can be subjected to any or all of the following penalties:

Incarceration. For misdemeanors, sentences may involve 12 months or less in the county jail or state prison, depending on the state. For felonies, the sentence can be one or more years. The judge may require that the entire sentence be served in jail. **Fines.** Courts impose fines to penalize defendants. These fines vary greatly, depending on the circumstances. For misdemeanors, the fine may be as little as for a traffic ticket, but for felonies can be thousands of dollars. Some fines can accrue daily until the illegally dumped waste is cleaned up.

Probation. A person on probation regularly meets with a probation officer and fulfills other terms and conditions, such as maintaining employment and attending counseling.

Community service. Courts often include as a part of probation the requirement that the defendant work for a specified number of hours with court-approved organizations, such as charities.

Restitution. Courts often require defendants to pay for any damage they caused to someone's property by their illegal dumping.

Remediation. Courts may require defendants to clean up and repair property damaged by their illegal dumping.

ITEMS THAT DO NOT FIT THROUGH THE BLUE BIN CONTAINER OPENING ARE NOT RECYCLABLES, SO IF RECYCLABLES DON'T FIT, TAKE IT WITH!
