A WORD FROM THE TREASURER

Once again, it's Spring and the township remains in good financial health. Plans for projects and improvements in the coming months are being prepared and compared to budget. If the budget is not sufficient, the project is either scaled down or eliminated.

This year we all will face a challenge: "How much are my taxes going to be next year in 2020?"

Through the County-wide reassessment, the increase / decrease or remain-the-same in taxes will not be known until November of 2019, when the final property values are established by the County. The timeline is: information from the informal review period is now being processed; formal Assessment Change Notices will be mailed to all property owners no later than July 1, 2019, at which time you will have until August 12th to file a formal appeal. These appeals will be heard, and then the information processed; the final assessed values of the properties won't be known until after all the informal reviews and formal appeals have been heard. The County will establish and release the final property valuations in Mid-November, 2019. (Normally,

municipalities start their own budgeting process in September or October. We must present the budget to the public in the beginning of December, and adopt it by the end of December – so, to receive critical information in mid-November will make for some stress!)

This is the information the County, School District and Township will need in order to establish their new millage rates, in order to provide the same tax revenue as before to provide the same services. An illustration would be: if the total sum of all property values in the township remain the same, and since properties were assessed at 25% of their value, and now will be assessed at 100% of property value, then the millage rate would go from 100% to 25% to make things come out even.

The township, school and county cannot, however, increase their projected tax revenue income by more than 10% during a reassessment. This does not mean that individual's property tax burden won't go up by more than 10% (because their assessed value may have increased.)

The financial outlook for our township remains strong and we are hopeful that the residents and business owners enjoy a wonderful, sometimes dry, Spring.



LSA GRANT AWARDED TO MIDDLE SMITHFIELD

Middle Smithfield Township's application for the Community Center & Library project was approved for a Local Share Account Monroe Program grant in the amount of \$250,000.

The Monroe County LSA funds will be used for construction of the Community Centers' 12,465 square foot building. The facility will be located at Echo Lake Park and will be a centralized, multi-purpose facility that will accommodate community gathering, cultural exhibits and offer a permanent home for the Library of the Smithfields.

The Community Center will not only house the Library of the Smithfields but amenities will be included in order for the center to have an emergency shelter. Supervisor Mark Oney said "we recently had a successful meeting with the Pocono Mountains Chapter of the American Red Cross and are excited about partnering together to operate a certified American Red Cross shelter in the new Community Building". Township Supervisor Annette Atkinson said "the Library housed by the Community

Center will give our area a great economic boost. The Pennsylvania Department of Education found that the return on investment for libraries is \$5.50 for every \$1 of tax money. In fact, the survey is referenced in the March issue of Pennsylvania Township News. Not only that, but studies show that, like a golf course, proximity has value too. There's a "halo" effect of library patrons spending at shops close to the library. They say "while I'm out at the library, I'll pick up . . . (this or that)".

Even greater than the return on investment for a library, or increased safety for our residents, is the social impact. Supervisor Mike Dwyer said that "ever since first getting into office, our first task was building a sense of community, and the role of libraries as community and cultural centers are undeniable. Many studies have shown libraries to be community builders, community centers for diverse populations, centers for the arts, universities, and champions of youth."

MIDDLE SMITHFIELD: ON BOARD WITH NEPA

Township Economic Development Manager, Patrice Dume, has been selected for the Monroe County seat on the Business Finance Board of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Alliance. (<https://www.nepa-alliance.org>) As a board member, Patrice will vote on new projects applying to loan programs.

The NEPA Business Finance Center, through its pool of federal, state and local funds, provides low-interest loans to qualified small businesses. Interest rates range from 1% to 4% and are fixed throughout the term of the loan, regardless of any upward movement in prime lending rates. NEPA Alliance Business Finance Corp. (BFC) is certified by the Small Business Administration (SBA) as a Certified Development Company (CDC) that is the intermediary between the SBA and Banks/Small Business clients. The SBA 504 Loan allows small business owners access to bond financing Loan terms are 10, 20 and 25 year, fixed rates and allow clients to do projects with as little as 10% down payments, thereby keeping valuable capital within the companies.

The objective is to provide financing to help small business create/retain jobs, attract additional investment from banks and other sources of private and public funding.

MIDDLE SMITHFIELD TAPS INTO STATE WATER COMMITTEE

The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) expects to convene the regional committees again this spring. Some of the duties tasked to the committee are:

- Review of the current State Water Plan
- Decide how the current plan been used?
- Figure out what data and tools are available?
- Evaluate the relevancy of the recommendations from the 2009 plan in today's world
- Suggest what topics should be included in the updated plan
- Decide if any statutory changes to Act 220 should be considered

BURNING IN MST IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED AND ENFORCED!

Many residents enjoy an evening sitting around a fire with friends and family, especially in the crisp spring air. Don't worry – the use of a recreational fire pit, to burn fire wood, supervised by a responsible adult at all times is still permitted. What's not permitted is the burning of garbage or any recyclable material, including yard waste! Burning in a burn barrel or an open burn is not only a nuisance to other residents, it's also very dangerous – and it is NOT allowed. Numerous brush fires, as well as structural fires, have been started from the practice of outdoor burning. Chapter 94 of the Township Code of Ordinances states that any person in violation of the chapter may be sentenced to pay a fine of up to \$150.00. The township takes this matter seriously. We will quickly investigate any complaints received and enforce the code for the health, safety and welfare of all residents.

ALTERNATE ZONING HEARING BOARD MEMBER POSITION OPEN

Middle Smithfield Township is seeking volunteers to serve on the Zoning Hearing Board as an alternate member. The Zoning Hearing Board is a five member board with up to three alternates comprised of township residents and is responsible for hearing matters, and rendering decisions, related to:

- substantive challenges to the validity of any land use ordinance
- appeals from the determination of the zoning officer
- applications for variances
- applications for special exceptions

Alternates must meet all of the same requirements of Zoning Hearing Board members and must be available to serve on the board for hearings and participate in workshops when scheduled. Zoning Hearing Board members must be residents of the township and may not hold any other office in the Township, either elected or appointed. Please contact the township if you are interested in volunteering for this position.

MST TO HOST PMPEI COURSE ON ZONING ADMINISTRATION & PSATS COURSE ON THE ETHIC ACT

Middle Smithfield Township Supervisors are committed to offering continuing education opportunities to the township volunteers, staff and elected officials. To accommodate that, the following courses are being offered at the Middle Smithfield Township building this spring.

The PMPEI (PA Municipal Planning Education Institute) course in Zoning Administration
Tuesdays, June 11, 18 & 25, 5:45pm – 9:00pm

This is a 3-session in-depth course for zoning hearing board members, zoning administrators, planning commissioners, and elected officials in the principals and practices for administering municipal zoning ordinances. The course covers the technical aspects of the various zoning applications and appeals, such as variances, special exceptions and nonconforming uses, and the requirements for zoning hearings. SHORT TERM RENTALS, ALSO KNOWN AS AIRBNB OR VACATION RENTALS

Vacation season is here! If you are renting your home as a short term rental – a rental for a period of less than 30 days at a time – and you have not obtained a zoning permit and short term rental license then you are in violation of the township code. Using your home as a short term rental or AirBNB vacation rental is considered a change of use under the Zoning Ordinance (see §044-090) and requires the property owner to obtain a permit for that change of use. Violation of the Zoning Ordinance could result in fines of up to \$500.00 per day. A one-time permit that costs only \$70.00 would bring your property into compliance.

In addition, an annual license is required under Chapter 150, Short-Term Rentals, of the Township Code (see §150-5). There is a fee of \$100.00 for the annual license which covers the processing of your application and one inspection. You can find all the necessary applications along with additional information and a link to the code on the township website: www.MiddleSmithfieldTownship.com. Our goal is to bring properties into compliance -- NOT to fine our residents. Resale Use & Occupancy Certificate

Are you selling your home? Did you recently purchase? Are you renting your home?

Chapter 179 of the Township Code of Ordinances requires the owner of a residential building who desires to lease or sell to obtain a use & occupancy certificate from the building inspector of the Township prior to the change of occupancy. PennState Extension

Land Use Webinar Series:

Members of the Middle Smithfield Township Planning Commission have been taking part in the annual Land Use Webinar Series from the Penn State Extension that began in January.

This monthly series consists of 5 webinars that focus on different land use topics that Planning Commission members, engineers, solicitors, etc., have to deal with across the state.

The following topics were discussed:

- Jan. 16- Zoning Ethics: Explored three common claims raised during zoning proceedings: conflicts of interest, bias, and bad faith.
- Feb. 20- Geodesign: Using data transparency and community voices for enhanced land-use planning.
- March 20- Municipal Options for Meeting MS4 Compliance Without Breaking the Budget
- April 17- Making the Most of Historical and Heritage Assets: How a Preservation-based Design Ethic Can Promote Economic and Community Vitality

DIRTY DIRT and WHAT IS IT?

Don't be fooled with social media postings of "Free Fill Dirt" unless you know where the dirt is coming from because it could be contaminated. An example of contaminated dirt is the smell of petroleum.

Monroe County Conservation District recently sent out a notice to all Monroe County Municipal Supervisors and Zoning Officers, informing them that any person placing clean fill that has been affected by a spill or release of a regulated substance must use PA Department of Environmental Protections ("PA DEP") Form FP-0014 (Certification of Clean

Fill) to certify the origin of the fill material and the results of the analytical testing to qualify the materials as clean fill.

If it is determined that you have received contaminated dirt, as the owner of the property you would be required to remove the fill dirt at your own expense, remediate of the property and possibly incur fines; all under the oversight of PA DEP.

Any questions should be directed to PA DEP, Waste Management Program, Technical Services Section 570-826-2511 or to report an emergency environmental complaint 866-255-5158 ext 2.

SPRING CLEANUP AFTERMATH

Many of our residents were thankful that we had our semi-annual cleanup and they were able to discard many unwanted items for a small fee, so that residents utilizing the service share in the cost of this service instead of placing the burden entirely on the taxpayer.

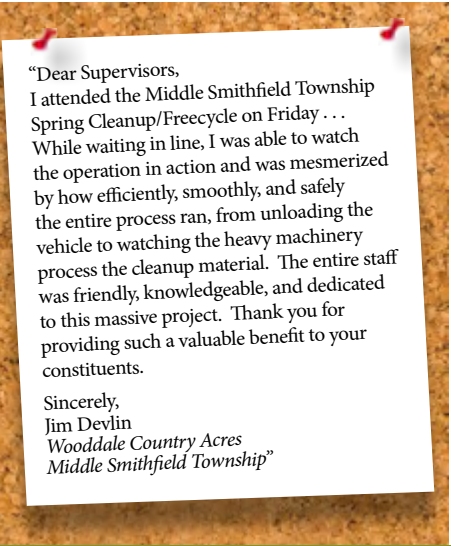
For example, the cleanup fees collected (starting at \$5 per carload) do not cover the entire expense of the township cleanup. This Spring's cleanup cost the township's taxpayers in excess of \$15,000, even after considering fees collected from residents attending and the recycling of metals. A quick breakdown of the Income and Expense of Spring Cleanup follows:

As noted above, Township Cleanup is not fully paid by those discarding items; but a large portion of the expense is covered by fees collected and recycling of the metals. We also save well over one dumpster fee, because residents participate in the Free-Cycle program.

ACT 537 UPDATE

Middle Smithfield Township Central Sewer is governed by DEP ACT 537 Special Study. This ACT 537 Special Study states that due to our high quality watershed, if someone can install a septic mound they must do this first before attempting to join the Central Sewer System along the Sewer System service corridor. This ACT 537 was put in place at a time when the Poconos was experiencing a rapid growth and the ACT served to protect the community.

The MST Central Sewer has received approval by Dept. of Environmental Protection to amend the ACT 537 Special Study in order to expand our services to accommodate the growing businesses within the Service Corridor on Route 209 and to include our Commercial Zone along the Route 402 corridor.

Existing businesses along the Route 209 corridor will now be required to connect to the Middle Smithfield Township Sewer System if they expand their business (and wastewater flow) OR their current septic system fails. New businesses/construction within 150 feet of the Sewer Line will also be required to join the central sewer. We have also added the Commercial Zone along Route 402 to the Act 537 Special Study for possible future expansion.

SEWER UPDATE

2019 Capital Improvement Projects:

Rehabilitation of Pump Station 4 – Maple Lane

This project has been awarded to Blooming Glen Contractors with a start date in early 2019. The estimated cost is \$135,499. This project involves the replacement of the piping in the wet well and valve vault and new control panel. This project is tentatively set to begin around mid-July.

Mt. Nebo Sewer Extension:

We are expanding the sewer line through the Commercial Zone to the North side of Route 209 at Mt. Nebo. The first stage is the sewer crossover of Route 209. Bid awarded to Wexcon, Inc., and has a start date of May 6, 2019. This project is being paid for through a grant.

Generators

The generator at the main Treatment Plant is being prepped to receive its new generator in the coming months. The pump stations will be reviewed and will have their generators replaced based on necessity over time. This project is to ensure that system is running properly during weather emergencies.

BLACK BEARS IN THE POCONOS

We have all had the experience of being surprised by a black bear somewhere along our travels. Whether it was crossing the road in front of our vehicle or raiding our garbage cans they are part of our lives in the Poconos. The main reason we encounter them is because we live in the best black bear habitat in North America. Our bears are healthy, large, productive, and overall in great shape because of the habitat they live in. The Poconos are a mixture of hardwood forest, wetlands, and developed areas and in that situation bears will thrive. They have lots of food be it acorns, blueberries, or birdseed. They have sheltered areas to den and hide in and they have all the things necessary to raise strong and healthy cubs. Their population remains strong and stable.

The black bears that call the Poconos home have been around for thousands of years and they have adapted very well to the growing population of humans in their habitat. It is because of their ability to adapt to people that they have survived. They have learned that people can be a source of food, not by eating people but the things we provide sometimes unknowingly; garbage, birdseed, dog food, and compost. Fortunately the black bears in our backyard are not aggressive and if left alone they will typically ignore and avoid people if at all possible.

The biology of black bears is fascinating. They are not true hibernators but they will spend the colder months in a den sleeping most of the time. A true hibernator will go to sleep and its metabolism will slow to very low levels this allows them to save energy and survive in this state. While a bear sleeps its heart rate and breathing slow very little which means they can get up and move around anytime they want and the males will frequently move throughout the winter. The females however have a very important job in the winter den. Every other year adult females give birth to cubs in the cold month of Jan. Average litter size in the Poconos is three, which is the highest avg. found anywhere on earth. These cubs are blind and barely covered with fur but the mother keeps them warm and nurses them inside the den. Most bears do not den in caves because there are very few caves in our area. They pick other sheltered areas including; tree blowdowns, rock crevices, and hollow trees and even under porches, decks and crawl spaces. They

will remain in the den until early April when the cubs weigh 5-8 pounds before venturing out into the spring sunshine. From that point on they are dependent on their mother for food and protection for the next 12-14 months. This is also the time when mother bears will aggressively protect their cubs from harm from any animal or person who could be perceived as a threat. This is where people have to be aware not to approach a black bear cub and to watch their dogs that may cause the mother bear to react and become a threat to your pet or even yourself.

Another interesting biological adaptation our black bears have is something called delayed implantation. Simply put this allows female bears to store valuable food energy during the summer and fall before denning for the winter and then giving birth to cubs. The way it works is bears will breed in June but the fertilized egg does not attach to the wall of the uterus until late November when the female goes into the den. It is nature’s way of insuring the bear gets enough food for both her and her future cubs to survive the winter. If the embryo would start developing in the summer months a baby bear born in September would not survive the winter and a mother bear that did not get the time to store enough food energy would not survive the winter either. What a great adaptation and one that allows most bear cubs a good chance of surviving.

Bear have many other interesting life facts that allow them to remain healthy and present in the Pocono Habitat. If we respect them and do not feed them they will cause us no harm and be part of future encounters as we move around the Poconos.

The Oak Grove Multi-Municipal Compost Processing program is jointly operated and available to residents of Middle Smithfield, Smithfield and Lehman Townships. The facility is centrally located at 3305 Oak Grove Drive in Middle Smithfield Township and is open Monday – Saturday, 7am – 2 pm. Closed Holidays To use the facility you must be a resident of one of the participating townships or a commercial business (via permit only) located in the townships.

Acceptable materials include leaves, shrubs (no roots) and shrubbery, tree trimmings, and branches cut into 3 -4 foot lengths and no larger than 12 inches in diameter.

FREE MULCH/COMPOST/WOOD CHIPS

The Oak Grove facility is a regular provider of mulch and compost to the MST Community Gardens on Coolbaugh Road. Your garden can benefit too! Self-serve products and materials offered at the facility are free mulch and compost (pending availability), and you must load the materials yourself. If loading assistance is needed an appointment must be made in advance and the fee is \$10 for each 3 yards.

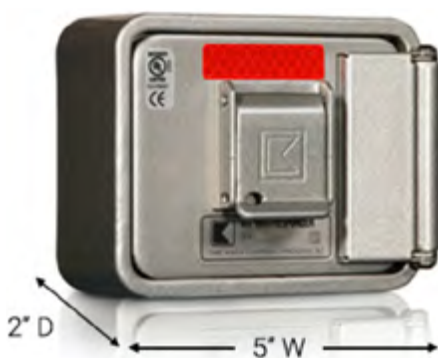

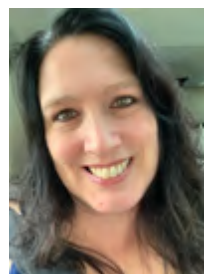

MIDDLE SMITHFIELD RECEIVES ROAD GRANT

from Monroe County Conservation District

The Monroe County Conservation District awards grant money for road maintenance projects to improve water quality in Monroe county. The funding from the State Conservation Commission is allocated through the 66 county conservation districts across the state. MCCD receives around \$225,000 per year for environmentally sensitive road maintenance projects. Middle Smithfield received more than half of that! The program is open to municipalities and agencies that maintain public roads and are trained in environmentally sensitive maintenance principles and practices.

The program participants may provide an in-kind match by doing the work themselves or covering portions of the costs, however no match is required. The Dirt Gravel and Low Volume Road Program strives to promote projects that reduce sediment pollution from roadways to local streams. This year's grant recipients are:

- Middle Smithfield Township — \$124,143 for drainage and road improvements on Firestone Lane - Total Project Value \$179,036
- Chestnuthill Township — \$120,000 for replacement of the Weir Creek crossing on County Park Road - Total Project Value \$231,310
- Pennsylvania Game Commission — \$50,180 for drainage and road improvements on Brady's Lake Road - Total Project Value \$50,180

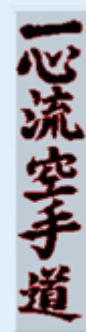

A BEAR OF A JOB: TOWNSHIP SUPERVISORS

Continued from the “Word from your Supervisors”. What do Township Supervisors do anyway?

To further quote PSATS and “Townships Today”, in honor of Local Government Week

The official duties of the Board of Supervisors can be found in the Second Class Township Code where Section 607 spells out the responsibilities, which take up about a page and require local leaders to do what you might expect: Hire staff, carry out state and federal laws, rules, and regulations, and maintain township equipment and facilities.

Most important, though, the code charges the board with “the general governance of the township and the execution of legislative, executive, and administrative powers to ensure sound fiscal management and to secure the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the township.”

Unclogging sewer drains, plowing snow at 2 in the morning, fielding complaints from residents, spending evening after evening at meetings, and eating a cold dinner or none at all because a resident wanted to have a two-hour discussion . . . aren’t even mentioned. Township supervisors do those things, too, and much more.

Balancing budgets and stretching tax dollars, providing quality services at an affordable cost, managing people and places, understanding state and federal laws, writing and passing ordinances, responding to residents and addressing their concerns, working with developers, overseeing volunteer boards and committees, purchasing equipment and supplies, negotiating contracts, and making unpopular decisions also come with the territory.

“Being a township supervisor is a far more difficult job than most people realize,” says Walt Whitmer, a senior educator with Penn State Cooperative Extension. “It’s a volunteer position with professional expectations.

Bev Cigler, Ph.D., professor of public policy and administration at Penn State University, agrees: “Local government is the workhorse of the governing system . . . People . . . may not know the specifics of the job, but quite often they’re happy because they’re getting good service,” she says, “and that’s all they care about.”

Trust, confidence remain high

In fact, a recent Gallup poll backs up Cigler’s contention that voters have a lot of faith in their local leadership.

In 2018, the group’s study revealed that 72% of U.S. adults say they have a “great deal” or a “fair amount” of trust in their local government, compared with 63% who say the same about their state government.

“The latest ratings,” Gallup says, “mark a continuation of fairly high levels of trust for local governments – a trend that has varied little over the past two decades. Meanwhile, confidence in state government has varied more, from a high of 80% in 1998 . . . to a low of 51% in 2009.”

Similar surveys conducted here in Pennsylvania have given municipalities equally high marks, and Penn State’s Walt Whitmer isn’t surprised.

Although township supervisors campaign for office and hold an elected position, that’s where the similarities with their counterparts in Harrisburg and Washington, D.C., end. They don’t have expense accounts, canned speeches or teleprompters, drivers or taxpayer-funded transportation, large staffs of advisers, or even comfy, wood-paneled offices. Instead, township supervisors are regular folks — your neighbors and friends — who aren’t in office for the glory or the glamour.

“If the general public could hear the stories that I hear [from local leaders],” Whitmer says, “they would have an even deeper appreciation for their local officials.”
